Call Meeting to Order

Chairman Stepanski called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m., indicating that there was a quorum for the Health and Human Services Committee.

Approve Minutes

The Health and Human Services Committee reviewed the meeting minutes for May 24, 2022. A motion was made by Supervisor Pinard to approve the minutes, seconded by Vice-Chairwoman DuBois and carried unanimously.

Mental Health

Director Teisha Cook presented the following resolutions to the Committee:

Authorizing the Modification of the 2022 Adopted County Budget (Mental Health Intergovernmental Transfer)

A motion was made by Supervisor Pinard to approve the resolution, seconded by Supervisor Cavanagh and carried unanimously.

Authorizing the Chairman to Enter into an Agreement with Crouse Health Hospital, Inc. and Modifying the 2022 Adopted County Budget

A motion was made by Chairman Stepanski to approve the resolution, seconded by Vice-Chairwoman DuBois and carried unanimously.

Authorizing the Chairman to Enter into an Agreement with Cazenovia Central School District for a Satellite Mental Health Clinic

A motion was made by Supervisor Pinard to approve the resolution, seconded by Supervisor Cavanagh and carried unanimously.

Discussion Regarding Opiate Funding Proposal for Mat Roosa - The County has received funding from the opiate settlement. Some of the funding will be available to outside agencies. Mat Roosa will assist us in developing a process for agencies to apply for mini grants. The contract for Mat Roosa is under \$20,000. A meeting will be scheduled with the County Attorney and County Administrator to discuss the details regarding how the settlement funding may be utilized.

Director Teisha Cook reported that social workers have been hired for the satellite clinics at Cazenovia and for one of the two positions at Chittenango schools. Oneida has decided to pause recruitment for the time being. We have not received applicants for Hamilton School, but continue to recruit.

Public Health

Director Eric Faisst presented the following resolutions to the Committee:

Authorizing the Modification of a Contract with Birnie Bus Service for Transportation Services

A motion was made by Vice-Chairwoman DuBois to approve the resolution, seconded by Supervisor Pinard and carried unanimously.

Re-Appointing Board Members to Madison County Board of Health

A motion was made by Supervisor Pinard to approve the resolution, seconded by Supervisor Cavanagh and carried unanimously.

Authorizing the Chairman to Enter an Agreement with the New York State Department of Health for State Indoor Radon Grant and Modifying the 2022 Adopted County Budget

A motion was made by Supervisor Cavanagh to approve the resolution, seconded by Supervisor Pinard and carried unanimously.

Director Eric Faisst wanted the Committee to be aware of a resolution that will be presented at the Government Operations Committee. The resolution is to utilize ARPA - American Rescue Plan Act funding for the following items. 1) \$25,000 for a Health Festival and Vaccination Event. This free event is planned for September 18th from 2-7 p.m. at Good Nature Farm Brewery. There will be 15-20 health related vendors and live bands. This event will encourage healthy behaviors and vaccinations for individuals age 18-25 that have the lowest vaccination rate. 2) \$58,000 for software that is HIPAA compliant and will assist with data collection and integrates with current software. 3) \$20,000 for Public Health app that will provide access to health information and notifications. 4) \$15,000 for wastewater testing for opiates and cannabis. Committee approved proceeding with the resolution.

Social Services

Commissioner Michael Fitzgerald presented the Commissioners Report. These numbers are through the month of May 2022. At this time, all numbers are within range at 42%.

Commissioner Fitzgerald presented the following resolution to the Committee:

A motion was made by Supervisor Pinard to approve the resolution, seconded by Vice-Chairwoman DuBois and carried unanimously.

Veterans Agency

Director Ron Raymer reported that things are going well at the Veterans Agency. Total client contacts for May was 388. A Madison County resident recently contacted the Veterans Agency expressing interest in donating some of their farm land as a Madison County Veteran's Cemetery. The County Attorney's office and Director Raymer will contact the County Attorney in Onondaga County as they have a Veterans Memorial Cemetery to obtain additional information.

Youth Bureau

Director Tina Louis provided an update regarding the \$7,750 in funding from OCFS. This is for a sports related program and needs to be utilized by December 31, 2022. The funding will be allocated to the Madison County Children's Camp this year. Next year, the funding will be increased and an RFP will be issued.

Director Tina Louis reported that space for the New Visions program on the county campus will be expanding. There will now be two classrooms, including one for carpentry instruction.

Executive Session

A motion was made by Chairman Stepanski to enter into executive session on the advice of counsel to discuss the performance of a particular contractor. Vice-Chairwoman DuBois seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously. A motion was made by Vice-Chairwoman DuBois to exit executive session; Supervisor Pinard seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Preferred Agenda

It was the consensus of the Committee to allow any eligible resolutions from today's meeting to be added to the Preferred Agenda. All resolutions were voted on and approved by the Committee.

Motion to Adjourn

There being no further business to discuss, a motion was made by Supervisor Pinard to adjourn the meeting at 11:23 a.m., seconded by Vice-Chairwoman DuBois and carried unanimously.

**AUTHORIZING THE CHAIRMAN TO ENTER INTO AN AFFILIATE AGREEMENT
WITH HEALTHY ALLIANCE IPA, LLC**

WHEREAS, Healthy Alliance IPA, LLC (“IPA”) is an independent practice association approved the State of New York to arrange for the provision of health and health related services; and

WHEREAS, IPA has contracted with Unite Us to issue unlimited web-based licenses for the Unite Us Referral Technology Service Software (the “Service Software”) throughout New York State; and

WHEREAS, IPA has established a Network which utilizes the Service Software, which includes social service organizations primarily providing non-clinical services, and primary and specialty care medical care providers, behavioral health providers, pharmacies, federally qualified health centers, health systems, hospitals, school, and government agencies to address social, behavioral and medical needs while also capturing and analyzing referral data; and

WHEREAS, IPA has established standards for Social Determinants of Health screenings and referrals across the Network; and

WHEREAS, IPA seeks to promote the Network and engage the Madison County Department of Health (“Affiliate”) to make and receive referrals in accordance with Network Standards to improve health and lower the total cost of care for vulnerable individuals through a focus on the social determinants of health; and

WHEREAS, the Madison County Department of Health both accepts referrals for Department services and refers individuals to needed services, and that this agreement would enhance the Department’s ability to connect our residents to needed services; and

WHEREAS, there are no fees or payments exchanged between the Parties as part of this agreement; and

WHEREAS, upon review, both the Board of Health and the Health and Human Services Committee feel it appropriate to enter in an affiliate agreement with the Health Alliance IPA;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors be and is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement on behalf of the County of Madison with Health Alliance IPA, LLC, in the form as is on file with the Clerk of the Board.

**FOSTER BOARDING HOME RATES
(Regular, Therapeutic, Special Needs and Emergency Foster Boarding Homes)**

WHEREAS, when children are in need of care outside of their family home, it is best for them to be cared for by a foster family within their home community rather than in an institution or foster care by agencies outside of Madison County; and

WHEREAS, the foster and adoptive families certified by Madison County Department of Social Services have done an excellent job caring for our children over the past several years, helping the Department to exceed many of the outcome guidelines set by New York State Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS); and

WHEREAS, the cost of caring for a child has increased steadily over the past year due to the increase in costs for such items such as food and fuel; and

WHEREAS, the rate of payments made to foster parents and adoptive parents in Madison County is below the maximum rate set by OCFS; and

WHEREAS, Social Services law §398-a (2-c) mandates local districts to pay the OCFS established maximum state aid rates for children in regular, therapeutic, special needs and emergency foster boarding homes as follows, and

WHEREAS, Districts paying less than 100% of the MSAR as of July 1, 2022, the current rate must be increased by no less than one half of the difference between their current rate and the maximum state aid rates

WHEREAS, foster parent and adoptive parent payments are included as part of the state reimbursement methodology; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that effective July 1, 2022, the foster care boarding home payment rates be and are hereby established as follows:

Infants-through-five years of age:	\$26.60 per day
Six-through-eleven years:	\$29.86 per day
Twelve years and over:	\$32.07 per day
Special:	\$53.25 per day
Exceptional:	\$82.23 per day

So long as these rates do not result in a decrease in payment for any adoptive parent already approved at a higher rate.

**FOSTER BOARDING HOME RATES
(Foster Parents, Adoptive Parents or KinGap Guardians)**

WHEREAS, when children are in need of care outside of their family home, it is best for them to be cared for by a foster family within their home community rather than in an institution or foster care by agencies outside of Madison County; and

WHEREAS, the foster and adoptive families certified by Madison County Department of Social Services have done an excellent job caring for our children over the past several years, helping the Department to exceed many of the outcome guidelines set by New York State Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS); and

WHEREAS, the cost of caring for a child has increased steadily over the past year due to the increase in costs for such items such as food and fuel; and

WHEREAS, the rate of payments made to foster parents and adoptive parents in Madison County is below the average paid by neighboring counties and below the maximum rate set by OCFS; and

WHEREAS, per 22-OCFS-ADM-15, the maximum state aid rates for replacement clothing and diapers paid to foster parents or adoptive parents or KinGAP guardians, have been discontinued; and

WHEREAS, Counties are required to increase their foster care or adoptive parents or KinGAP guardians room and board rates by 5.4%; and

WHEREAS, foster parent and adoptive parent payments are included as part of the state reimbursement methodology; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that effective April 1, 2022, the foster care boarding home payment rates be and are hereby established as follows:

Infants-through-five years of age:	\$23.81 per day
Six-through-eleven years:	\$24.70 per day
Twelve years and over:	\$28.73 per day
Special:	\$43.05 per day
Exceptional:	\$66.67 per day

So long as these rates do not result in a decrease in payment for any adoptive parent already approved at a higher rate.

**AUTHORIZING THE MODIFICATION OF THE 2022 ADOPTED COUNTY BUDGET
(Rental Supplement Program)**

WHEREAS, the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance has allocated monies to counties related to the New York State Rental Supplement Program (RSP) per 21-LCM-24; and

WHEREAS, these monies are to be used to provide vital rental assistance to individuals and families who are experiencing homelessness or are facing an imminent loss of housing. Households must earn no more than 50% of the area median income (AMI) with initial priority given to households who earn no more than 30% of AMI. Rental supplements will be set at 85% of the Fair Market Rent (FMR); and

WHEREAS, these funds being 100% state reimbursed through the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the 2022 Adopted County Budget be modified as follows:

**ABOLISHING ONE FULL-TIME CASEWORKER POSITION AND ONE FULL-TIME
CASEWORKER ASSISTANT POSITION AND CREATING A FULL-TIME SENIOR
CASEWORKER POSITION**

WHEREAS the Commissioner of Social Services recommends that a currently unoccupied Caseworker Assistant position and an occupied Caseworker position both be abolished and upgraded to a single Senior Caseworker position to be created in the Department of Social Services; and

WHEREAS the Personnel Officer certifies that Senior Caseworker is the appropriate classification based on the description of duties for this position; and

WHEREAS, the salary and fringe benefits for the Senior Caseworker will not generate a local cost increase; and

WHEREAS, with the implementation of NY State Family First Legislation in October 2021, the requirements as it related to the placements of Juvenile Delinquents into the custody of DSS requires more of an administrative involvement and oversight outside of the scope of Caseworkers duties; and

WHEREAS, the caseworker currently doing this work has the knowledge and expertise to do the work that meets the Family First requirements of aftercare obligations saving the county \$52.00 per day from the date of placement for every adjudicated Juvenile Delinquent ordered into the custody of The Department of Social Services; and

WHEREAS, the caseworker currently doing this work has provided supervision to coworkers in learning compliance with the new mandates in conjunction with ongoing collaboration with other agencies; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that one (1) full-time Caseworker position and one (1) full-time Caseworker Assistant position be and hereby are abolished; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that one (1), full-time Senior Caseworker position be and hereby is created immediately; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Commissioner of Social Services be and hereby is authorized to fill said position effective immediately in accordance with Civil Service Law and Rule and the Agreement between Madison County and the CSEA White Collar Unit.
